BARBIE TURNS 61



WALKING TRAIL NAMED FOR DON & BERNICE WATSON



When the red cars ceased running, the right of way they utilized became available. While other communities gobbled up the land, Duarte opted to use that strip as a bicycle, equestrian, walking trail. Every day it is utilized by residents who get their exercise and meet their neighbors. Some people call it the Duarte downtown. Its very existence today is much due to the work of Don Watson, In 1968 he became the first African American council member, and 1971 he was elected Mayor, the first black mayor in Duarte and in the San Gabriel Valley.

His wife at the time, Bernice, is well known for her co-authorship of the book *On the Duarte*, a comprehensive history of Duarte up to the city's incorporation. Bernice died in 2012. Through the efforts of their daughter, Paula Watson Gardner, the trail was renamed and a dedication held. It is a fitting tribute during Black History Month.

THE FIVE MILLNER SIBLINGS

CHARLES MILLNER: The oldest Millner sibling graduated from Duarte High School in 1963. He started teaching at his alma mater, Cal Poly Pomona, in September of 1972 where he remained for 42 years. He was Chairman of the Chemistry Dept. when he retired.

DARRELL MILLNER: Graduating from DHS in 1964, He attended UC Irvine and graduated from Cal Poly. At the University of Oregon he received his D.Ed. Degree and worked at Portland State University in 1974 in the Black Studies Dept., retiring in 2014.

STEVE MILLNER: A 1966 DHS graduate, he attended San Jose State University before transferring to the University of California at Berkeley and earning a Doctorate in Sociology. He was the first African American to teach at the University of Mississippi.

DIANNE MILLNER: She graduated from DHS in 1967, She graduated Phi Beta Kappa from UC Berkeley, and earned a law degree from Stanford Law School in 1975.

JEFF MILLNER: He graduated from DHS in1969, attended San Jose State University and graduated with a B.A. in sociology, then attained a teaching credential He graduated from Harvard Law School in 1977 and received a law degree in 1980.
