A LOVING TRIBUTE TO VICTORIA DUARTE CORDOVA

As long as I can remember, our Aunt Vicky was the matriarch of our family as well as the "keeper" of our families history.

Her sister Beatrice Duarte Cuellar (my grandmother) passed away when I was very young but I do remember Vicky was always very close to her and all of her nieces and nephews. I grew up living next-door to aunt Vicky in Arcadia before she moved back to Duarte. Every Sunday I'd go with aunt Vicky and (her mother, my Great Grandmother) Albertina Rosenda Serradell who we called "Grandma George" to the church service at San Gabriel mission. My earliest memories were of sitting through the long church service not only in English but Latin as well!

The highlight of the Sundays was afterwards when everyone would gather to talk and catch up with each other there was always punch and cookies!

Vicky always spent part of the day telling me and which ever other cousin came along, stories about our family and how we were connected to the San Gabriel mission.

She was so passionate about her genealogy studies and discoveries and wouldn't hesitate to take the time to share the information with anybody (family) willing to listen.

I would go next door sometimes to visit her and she would spend hours telling me about our family's history. But being so young, I'd pretty quickly lose track of what she was saying -she was trying to share so much information, at that time it was just way too much for my nine year old brain to take in!

I remember when she gave me my very own copy of our family tree, It went back nine generations from my grandmother! I remember her going over each entry and telling me about each person. At that time she was especially fascinated with Eulalia Perez who worked for San Gabriel mission as "keeper of the keys".

The summer I turned 11 we moved to Oregon although our family all stayed very close, my time with Aunt Vicky was now letters and a yearly visit.

Unfortunately as it often happens I think we were all a bit lazy assuming Aunt Vicky would be around forever to carry this wealth of information she had.

I know that it was a great wish of hers that someone in the family would continue the genealogy work that she did for so much of her life. It's very sad that none of us did but we are very very fortunate that with Vicky's involvement in the Duarte Historical Society our family history is safe for future generations.

I can't begin to express my appreciation to all of you who put so much time and effort into preserving the history of Duarte for all of the generations to come.

RANCHO DUARTE?

In 1977 Duarte city council members and many residents were bent on upgrading the City's reputation by renaming the town "Rancho Duarte." The idea was passed about but eventually dropped.

Former council member Robert Harbicht later revitalized the idea. He felt the name change would recognize the civic improvements and added it would reflect the City's history. The idea grew to rename the city "Rancho Duarte," a change to add a touch of class. Reaching out to Duarte residents, the idea was widely discussed by residents and the city council, but in the end the name change was rejected and today we remain simply "Duarte."

GIFT OF A PIANO

The Samuel Maxwell family came to Duarte in the early 1880s, buying the home ranch (44 acres) from Nehemiah Beardslee and improving the beautiful adobe home. The three girls, Rose, Marguerite and Marie, grew up in Duarte enjoying the ranch and the life of the growing community. The beautiful piano is a gift from them.



MEET BLAINE HEBERT

This charming man spent more than an hour getting acquainted with the inner workings of the Museum's 1890 piano. He removed and studied the dust covered pieces and when finished, his diagnosis was not surprising. The piano is the last of the square grand pianos and although he said he could get it working, it would not be worth it. The felt has been eaten by a culprit called a carpet beetle


