HOW WE GET AROUND

They say that history repeats itself and that's certainly true of the transportation evolution which unfolded in the San Gabriel Valley, with the nearly one billion dollar Gold Line Foothill Extension from Pasadena to Azusa.

Many consider electric rail the future of transportation, but the region actually had it more than a century ago. From the early to mid-1900s, SoCal was abuzz with electric rail service.

Before the car culture of Los Angeles consumed the landscape, the area was blanketed by a webwork of rails stretching from the mountains to the sea. It was the Pacific Electric Railway. From 1901 to 1961, the Pacific Electric, otherwise known as the Red Car, provided an inexpensive and classy way for residents, shoppers and businessmen to get around.

MUSEUM RECEIVES CALAM SMALL BUSINESS COVID 19 RELIEF GRANT



DUARTE HAS LOST A LEGEND:



Frances "Nita" Carey was an integral part of Duarte for most of her life. She was born in San Marino on September 2, 1925 and died on December 1 this year. She was 16 years old when she married Ed Carey in 1941 and they raised three children: Larry, Steve, and Sharon. Ed passed away in 2004.

"Both of my parents were always dedicated to the betterment of Duarte," says her daughter Sharon Fehring. "You know how some teenagers would be embarrassed to have their parents around? Well, that wasn't me. I always was proud to be in their presence."

Having moved to Duarte in 1949, Nita joined the Duarte Woman's Club in 1958 and was active on the Board for most of those years. She served as president in 1960 and again in 2009. She always fondly remembered riding in the Duarte Route 66 Parade with Margaret Kerry, better known as "Tinker Bell."

Nita's daughter Sharon says of her mother's hard work: "Mom deserves a great deal of praise for the multitude of hours she devoted to civic affairs. She was presented with so many awards that I ran out of wall space to hang them. But Mom was never about the acknowledgments; she devoted her time to volunteering because she enjoyed helping people."

Her son, Larry recalled "Back in the 50s and 60s my mom would sit on the front porch where she could watch my brother, Steve, and I hike the path to the top of the foothills before there were any houses there. As we would leave the house to hike the hill, Mom would always say 'Watch out for rattlesnakes!' That area is now the community of Bradbury."

Nita's many years of volunteering in Duarte put her in the forefront of numerous organizations. She fully supported Duarte Schools through the PTA, she lent a hand to the Duarte Chamber of Commerce when needed, and she supported DYAC, a sports organization which her family helped organize. Nita was a team mom and actively supported the Club and its young athletes for many years.

Some of the years she remembered so fondly were her poll worker days. When a friend called and asked if she would like to work at the local polling place in Duarte, Nita thought it might be fun, so she agreed to help. On November 4, 2008, she received recognition from the County Board of Supervisors for being the longest serving poll worker in Los Angeles County. That year she served for the 80th time. It was in 1952 when Eisenhower was on the ballot, that Nita first performed her civic duty. In the following years, she served numerous hours as a poll worker for national, city, primary, and school board elections in addition to a small water board election held in what was then called "Rock Town." Along the way she began working as an "inspector." and recalled that in the "old days I knew everyone who came in to vote, because we were a smaller town back then."

'Nita Carey was a true pillar in our community," says Mayor Pro Tem Margaret Finlay. "She left a mark of excellence and distinction upon a community that needed direction, to grow into the city that we have become. We will all remember her for her kindness to others and her always present smile and good works. The City of Duarte is a better place because Nita Carey worked hard to have it become such. She will be missed by many." Nita leaves behind, one brother, Jim, 3 children, 9 grandchildren and more than 15 great-grandchildren
