Route 66

I have been gone from Duarte since June 20. My friend, Frankie, is moving to North Carolina and I was helping her move. We have been friends for more than 50 years, ever since we met as roommates at the University of Oklahoma. She has lived in Southern California for 34 years, so moving lock, stock, and barrel is no easy task.

We took a "road trip" and followed Route 66 from Duarte, through Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, and Oklahoma. In Oklahoma City, Route 66 turned north to Tulsa, while we continued east on Interstate 40 into Arkansas, and then Tennessee, before entering North Carolina.

In 2026, we will be celebrating the 100th Anniversary of U.S. Route 66. "The Mother Road" was established on November 11, 1926, by Congress. The final stretch of Route 66 was decommissioned north of Williams, Arizona in 1984.
